

Converting a rubric result to a grade

When we mark student work on a rubric, we get high quality feedback that can help students and teachers find out what they are ready to learn next. Sometimes, however, we want a summative result to report to stakeholders, such as parents.

Before we used rubrics, we would assign grades to student work using a variety of methods. The purpose of converting a rubric result into a grade is to mimic the type of grade students would have received under your old systems. We want a system that produces similar grades, with a similar class average.

An easy way to do this is to make a conversion table. Look at this example rubric and conversion table:

- In our example, we add up the number of boxes filled or below the student's level – in this case it's 8 (Skill 1 = 2, Skill B = 3, Skill C = 2, Skill D = 1 and 2+3+2+1=8)
- Try and think about what kind of grade each level represents. In our example, a student getting the lowest level is an E/E+. The medium level is a C level. The high level is a B+/A level. The highest level is an A+ level.
- Students fail if they score poorly and also fail to show one or more skills. You could also simply make displaying each skill a hurdle requirement.
- The boxes *aren't* all worth the same amount. If they're worth the same amount, grades are too low. In general, more difficult skills (higher boxes) are worth less.
- It can be a good idea to make the conversion table after you have marked a class' worth of work. Then you can check that you're successfully converting their rubric result to a grade similar to what they would've got under the old system.
 - Your top student should usually be getting the highest grade.
 - Check what your average grade is - is this similar to what you would have had under your old system of grading? If not, adjust your conversion table.
